At Sunset we promote curiosity, critical thinking and problem-solving as a means of engagement. We want to give your children experiences that will enrich them. We want to share our space with nature. In fact, we will be hosting caterpillars very soon, and caring for them until they can be released as butterflies!

It was a truly a magical afternoon!











Total Days in Session

Days of instruction are different than "days in session". Days in session are days that school is "open" but the students are not necessarily in

"open" but the students are not necessarily in attendance. On a "day of instruction", students are to be in attendance and under supervision for the purposes of receiving instruction in an educational program.

Prescribed Minimum Hours of Instruction

In accordance with the School Act, a Board of Education must offer not less than the following hours of instruction in a school year to students enrolled in the schools in its district:

848 hours of instruction for students in Kindergarten 873 hours of instruction for students in grades 1 to 7 947 hours of instruction for students in grades 8 to 12

 The Ministry of Education has mandated the addition of one non-instructional day for discussions/activities that develop evidence-based approaches to curriculum implementation.
